Who are we now?

Over 50 people attended the combined "State of the Church" and Charge Conference after worship on December 3rd. The Staff Parish Relations Committee took care of the set up, with some help from the Mochi making group—thank you!

The event began with a delicious soup and salad lunch, and everyone had a great time chatting with one another. Several people who had not been at church for some time were there, as was Rev. Paul Kottke, our

District Superintendent.

Rev. Vivian opened the meeting with prayer, then gave a presentation about our church. She has done research about trends in our church over the past 45 years. The information she provided helped everyone gain a better

understanding of the challenges we face. The Power Point is available on the church Facebook page (www.facebook.com/simpsonumcarvada/).

The challenges the church is currently experiencing arise from two sources: the changes in the overall culture in our country, and the unhelpful ways the people of our church have sometimes responded (or not responded) to the changes in the culture.

While every church goes through a predictable life cycle, Rev. Vivian explained that this church is not just in decline, but is near the end of its life. Rev. Paul concurred, and said that many churches in the Rocky Mountain Conference are facing the same situation.

The good news is that there is hope for the future. The church has enough money in restricted funds to carry us for a few years. So, if it is not a question of money, why is the church struggling to survive?

As the hymn "I Am the Church" says, "the church is not a building, the church is not a steeple, the church is

not a resting place, the church is a people!" The simple truth is that we do not have enough people involved in the life of the church to survive.

A key factor unique to this congregation has masked this issue for some time, and that factor is the popularity of our cultural events. A number of people who used to attend worship and Sunday school, who used to serve on committees and repair the building, now only attend Hina Matsuri or the Bazaar.

Some are simply not able to drive any more, or as far as they must to attend church. Distances that used to be easily accomplished on a Sunday morning are now barriers to attending worship.

For others, arguments and ill will built up over the years, and attending a festival allows them to be supportive without having to talk with someone they wish to avoid.

For some younger people it is no longer important to attend a Japanese American congregation; a church close to home with children's programs suits their needs better than Simpson does.

In order to be a vibrant church, one that can continue to offer support and space to cultural events, the congregation of Simpson United Methodist Church must attract new people, grow disciples by growing faith, and do all this while retaining an authentic identity that honors our past.

Like all churches over 100 years old, this church has faced this kind of challenge before. The church of the 1950s was very different from the church of the 1930s. And the kids who attended youth group in the 1980s looked very different (continued on page 4)



Tea and Conversation



As I type these words I am just beginning to recover from the whirlwind of activity that was December. From the Charge Conference to Christmas Eve, my calendar was packed with things to do. Like many of you, I not only had a great many tasks to accomplish at work, but family obligations as well. And then, of course, I caught the terrible cold that people were passing around, and - well, I never did quite catch up.

And so I find myself looking forward to a new year. Surely 2018 will be calmer with fewer stressful demands! Then the voice of experience sounds in my head, and I know that this new year will be just like last year in one key respect: it is an opportunity filled with possibilities, and I alone will determine its outcome.

Now, I'm not foolish enough to think that I am in control of life. Unexpected events will happen in 2018, just as they did in 2017. Some events will be happy; others will knock me off balance. But no event can determine whether the year is fruitful and good, or destructive and painful. That is the one thing I can control: my own response to what happens in my life.

When I was young, I got up each morning and just did what had to be done. Every morning I showered and dressed for the day, and then lived out the drama of all the events of the day. Bad traffic? Bad day. Nasty comment made to me? Angry response followed by hours of recounting the scene for friends. Good review of a performance brought elation at being praised in public; that felt good. But a bad review brought depression and self-doubt.

At some point in my twenties, deeply hungry for a calmer, more secure inner life, I sought some way to become more anchored, more rooted in a deeper sense of myself. I was raised in the Methodist Church, but the church didn't seem to have any sense of purpose to offer me. I wandered from being a "born again" Christian to the est movement, from Wicca to psychic fairs, always seeking something deeper, something meaningful.

Until I found God again in silent prayer. In the silence all the drama of life seemed to fade into the background as God's gentle, loving light revealed what is true and permanent: God alone, and my existence in God. I will lose my body, but my soul - that which is expressed through my mind, my body, my emotions - my soul exists forever, safe within God's strong, eternal presence. That realization gave purpose and meaning to my life.

I am not alone in my desire to have a sense of purpose and meaning. My son and daughter-in-law took us to see the new "Star Wars" movie on Christmas night. It's all about purpose! Luke Skywalker has lost his sense of purpose and become bitter. Rey, the young protagonist, is desperately searching for a purpose. Kylo Ren has rejected his family's purpose out of anger and pain, and controlling others to avoid feeling his pain is becoming his purpose. And, of course, - **spoiler alert!** - wise Yoda understands what the purpose of life really is, and intervenes at a key moment to open eyes and change the course of events.

Whenever I encounter a church in decline, inevitably I learn that the congregation has lost a shared sense of purpose, a shared sense of being united in some mission for Christ. Their squabbles vary - about the building for some, the kitchen for others. But the squabbles merely mask their reluctance to ask: why are we here? Does this church really matter?

A sense of purpose is so important that God advises us in the Bible - Proverbs 29:18: Where there is no purpose, the people perish. Or - as Eugene Peterson puts the same verse in the Message: If people cannot see what God is doing, they stumble all over themselves, but when they attend to what God reveals, they are most blessed.

How can we possibly "see what God is doing"? Well, one way is just to do our best to be really present in each moment. As one wise older pastor once said, "Some people are entrenched in the past; others constantly project themselves into the future. But the present is all we really have. If you aren't living in the present, you aren't really living." God created the present for us to enjoy what God is doing today, right now. That's how we can "attend to what God reveals."

As we enter the new year, I invite you join me as we "attend to what God reveals" by living in the present moment together. One way I have learned to strengthen my ability to be present is to ask myself each morning, "What does God want to do through me *today* at Simpson United Methodist Church?" That question prompts me to look at each moment of the day as an opportunity to be a vessel for God's love, God's peace, God's encouragement.

And that's my purpose for 2018 - to grow in my ability to attend to what God is revealing, right here.



STATE OF THE CHURCH (continued)

In order to thrive once again, the people of this church must work together to answer some key questions:

- Why do we exist as a church?
- What do we value most about being Christian?
- ♦ How can we live into those values?
- Where is God in all this?

Answering these questions will help us discern who we are as a people of God today.

As she did for our successful retreat, Rev. Vivian will lead us in these conversations. But, as happened at the retreat, the people of the church had to provide the answers to the questions.

The process Rev. Vivian will use has three phases: **Dialogue**, **Discuss**, **Decide**. The first phase, Dialogue, is like an extended brainstorming session. The above questions will be asked in different ways, and people will

be encouraged to explore new ways of thinking. Courtesy will be observed, and no ideas will be rejected or judged.

People will have several opportunities to participate in the Dialogue phase. No votes will be taken and no decisions will be made, so everyone is encouraged to attend one or more Dialogue sessions:

Tuesday, January 9 at 6:30 pm Tuesday, January 16 at 2:00 pm

SPECIAL OPPORTUNITY -Saturday, January 20 8:30 am - 3 pm

Arrangements will be made for at least one Dialogue session with the Nichigo congregation, using an interpreter so they may fully participate.

Rev. Vivian will work with the Council and SPRC to assess the process as it unfolds. More Dialogue sessions may be added if it becomes clear that they are needed.

Once the Dialogue phase has led to a shared understanding of why this church exists as well as a shared set of values, the **Discussion phase** will begin.

During the Discussion phase the conversations focus on whether the church's current worship format, staff, ministries, and governing structure will serve the new shared sense of identity and mission.

No decisions are made during the Discussion phase as new ways of thinking and doing church are

learned. People may wish to visit other churches to explore new ways of doing church, or attend a workshop, or study a book.

When a new direction for our church has been identified and people have fully discussed ways to live into that

identity, only then will the church come together in the **Decision phase**.

A final series of opportunities to come together will be offered to make decisions based on what has been learned. Decisions may include changes in staff, worship, youth and children's ministries, and the arrangement and use of the building.

Every decision will be assessed in light of the new identity and the new direction in which God is leading.

Once key decisions have been made, a special Charge Conference will be scheduled to enact the decisions and possibly elect more leaders. It will be publicized to everyone so full participation is possible.

This process will only succeed if the people of the church support it with their presence and their prayers,

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Simplifying Our Leadership Structure

For over a year the Church Council has been exploring new ways to organize church leadership. Fewer and fewer people are willing or able to do the work of maintaining the church, much less learn how to grow it.

The Council has identified a promising new model called Simple Leadership. This model has been successfully adopted by churches throughout the country, and approved for church leadership by the General Conference and the Judicial Council of the United Methodist Church.

The Simple Leadership model replaces multiple committees with a single Church Board, whose meetings must be open to all, plus two committees whose work must be done in confidence (Nominations and Staff Parish Relations Committee).

This model incorporates the Trustees and Finance Committee into the Church Board. The whole Board does their work, and is responsible for the voting process required by law for some of our work.

Other ministry areas, such as the O.N.E. Committee and Worship Committee, could be represented by the Chair of their committee, who may serve on the Board.

The Church Council will learn more about this model at its meeting on January 31 (7:00 pm). More complete information will be presented, and there will be time allowed for discussion. **Everyone is welcome to attend this meeting.**

If the Council votes (either in January or at its February meeting) to move in this direction, Rev. Paul Kottke, our District Superintendent, will support our decision (his support is required by *The Book of Discipline*).

The church could begin implementation immediately, and assess its effectiveness for a few months before scheduling a Charge Conference. Any final decision must be made at a Charge Conference.

Silver and Gold . . . Make new friends, but keep the old . . .

This is the final installment of a 3 part series on building consistent habits easily shared by both long time members, and first time worshipers.

Habit 3: Pray

None of us knows what is in store for our church. Everyone I have interacted with over this year as SPRC chair is working hard, in their own way, to help this church be healthy again. To thrive again.

I have come to realize that many of us have different pictures in our minds of what "healthy again" looks like. The only one who truly knows the answer is God. The only way for us to discern that, is to come into closer relationship with God. That, in my opinion, begins with prayer. Regular prayer. A habit of prayer.

Ephisians 6:18 And pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the Lord's people.

1 John 5:14 This is the confidence we have in approaching God: that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us.

For those of you already in this habit, congratulations! I am envious, and I look to you as my example. Personally, I find life so frenetic nowadays that even when I commit to myself to slow down and make time for God, I have a hard time keeping the commitment. Traditional, in person, meetings never fit in my schedule. Then Bishop Karen gave us another option: online digital devotions. I have been participating in this as often as I can since it began last week. It is a 25 minute morning conference call led by clergy in the Mountain Sky area.

After only a few days I have realized God is willing to meet us where we are ... including online. The devotional provides a structure and supportive community that is accessible no matter where I physically happen to be. It helps me pause, pray, and make space to listen for God.

MEMBERSHIP QUESTIONS

Many people were surprised at the Charge Conference when over 150 people's names were read aloud and it was announced that they may be moved to "inactive" status. Although this process is supposed to be done every year, this church (like so many others) has not tended their membership rolls for some time now. And so, this normal part of the annual meeting seemed unusual to them.

First, let us be very clear: <u>absolutely no one is being put out of the church</u>. No matter what action is taken or decisions made by church leaders, <u>every member listed will continue to be a member of this church UN-LESS they ask to be removed or they pass away.</u>

If everyone will continue to be a member of the church, then why do we read names aloud at the church's annual meeting?

The answer is simple, and rooted in experience with human nature. Everyone who becomes an adult member of the church stands before the congregation and promises to support the church with their "prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness." They are sincere when they make that promise.

But then life happens. Some move away, and forget to tell the church office. Some simply drift away, and stop attending church, serving on committees, and participating in choir or Bible studies. Although they may still donate money, church leaders come to understand that they cannot call upon these people to serve in any way. And the church needs people who are present and active in the spiritual life of the church.

And so, the names are listed and read aloud. The purpose of reading the names aloud is to spur communication and action. Perhaps some names were listed by innocent mistake. Perhaps some are young adults in college who can't attend, some serve in the military, and others are elderly people who are homebound. Once the church becomes aware of this, their status will remain as "active" members.

But for those who are able to participate and choose not to for whatever reason, the church is directed to put together a group of people who will reach out to them over the course of the year. The goal is to encourage them to return to active participating in the religious life of the church. Some will return, some will not for a variety of reasons. And some will simply need more time to make a decision.

Rev. Vivian and Ruby Hada (our new Membership Secretary) want to put together a group of people who will help them go through the list, correct mistakes, and contact people to encourage them to become active again. We have a year to do this work and report to the church at its next regular Charge Conference. If you would be willing to help Ruby and Rev. Vivian, please contact Ruby or the church office and let us know. We will hold our first meeting some time in late January to decide how to best do this task.


