Tea and Conversation



My friends and I entered Anaheim stadium with the rest of the people, thousands upon thousands of us streaming into the venue that day to hear evangelist Billy Graham. I was a well behaved, church going teen back then, though I had recently stopped attending the Methodist church in which I had been confirmed just a couple of years earlier.

The church I attended in Southern California had stopped talking about Jesus. My youth director had casually said that it was silly to believe in the bodily resurrection of Jesus, that all the smartest people had abandoned that idea. The pastor and other leaders were active and vocal in a number of political causes, from civil rights to anti-war protests. I heard sermons about justice and peace, but very little about God or Jesus. The Bible seemed to be irrelevant.

My friends and I attended the event in Anaheim more out of curiosity than interest. We were rehearsing for a play that required us to learn and use American Sign Language letters. We thought it would be good practice to sit in the stands and spell out the words being said as fast as we could. And, since the event was highly publicized and in all the news, we would also be where the action was. A "twofer"!

And so we walked in, got some refreshments, and settled into our seats. As the opening speakers and musicians warmed up the crowd, we happily alternated between practicing signing and enjoying our snacks. We were getting pretty good, and having a lot of fun.

But then Billy stepped to the pulpit and began to speak, and something in the air changed. Yes, Rev. Graham had a commanding voice and was certainly handsome - that was noticed even by teen girls who usually wouldn't give church a second thought. But it wasn't just his voice and face that drew us in; it was his message.

Here was a man who took Jesus seriously. Here was someone who seemed to know God personally, and who was filled with some sort of power by that God. Here was someone who found meaning in a book my church had left in the dust, and who heard God's voice speaking through those pages.

And that voice reached out to me. For the first time I heard someone saying that God not only loved me, but that God loved me even though God was well aware of all of my faults, all of my sins. For the first time I heard the message that if I gave my life to Christ, God would walk with me through all of my days and help me live a life that would be filled with meaning.

It isn't that I hadn't ever heard that message in the Methodist Church; it's that the people who delivered that message didn't seem to believe it themselves. Billy Graham did, and his deep belief in his message is what made it stand out from the average message I'd been hearing from the pulpit most of my life.

At the end of the message I went forward with hundreds if not thousands of others that night, singing "Just As I Am," Graham's signature altar call hymn. And I was surprised at what happened next. We were met by people from hundreds of area churches. No one pressured me, no one argued with me. They just repeated Rev. Graham's message of repentance and forgiveness.

But then they added the critically important tag line: repentance must be followed up with a life long commitment to follow Jesus Christ, and that commitment must be lived within the Body of Christ, expressed through a local church. There I heard the basics of Christian life presented succinctly for the first time: get into a church that appeals to me, one that teaches the Bible, helps you pray, gives you ways to serve, and grow your love and knowledge of Jesus. Put Him first, and you will receive everything else that matters in life - and for all eternity.

It's been decades since that night in Anaheim, but I still follow Jesus. Some days I do better than others, but every day I remind myself that if I put Him first I will receive and know joy and love and have a deeply satisfying life. And that's because my worst day is not the day that defines me: the day I decided to follow Christ defines me.

I am sure that on his death Rev. Graham was greeted by his Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, and heard the words all Christians long to hear: well done, thou good and faithful servant. Rest in peace, Billy, and thank you.




To participate, please bring one non-perishable item for the Arvada Food Bank.

Report on Dialogue-Discuss-Decide Process

Three "Dialogue" opportunities were offered during February. Most had only three or four in attendance; this includes several people who attended more than one session.

This process is a part of the Transitional Intentional Interim Ministry work the church agreed to do when Rev. Vivian was appointed to Simpson UMC last July. The focus of TIIMS work is on the church and its mission: to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

The work of the church is done through worship, Sunday school for children and youth, prayer groups, classes and other faith strengthening/deepening experiences for adults, and hands-on service to people beyond the walls of the church.

The results of the September all church retreat were provided to those who attended the sessions.

The question asked was: how can we move into the future in new ways that serve Christ and build Christian faith? Here are some of the ideas and opinions expressed during these sessions:

- Create opportunities for hands-on mission projects that families can do together.
- The daisy-chain method of communication needs to become more self-aware in order to be sure it is contributing to the renewal of the church and not its detriment.
- Learn how to market the church more effectively. These ideas included everything from hiring someone to help us be more effective in using social media to making sure we have a sign facing the new Park and Ride that lets commuters know that we are here, when worship occurs, and provide other information.
- How can we leverage the strength of our cultural activities to benefit the church and have the church also benefit the cultural activities, as they are interwoven?
- Can we interface with cultural organizations, such as the Asian Pacific Development Center, more effectively to draw people to the church?
- Put a bulletin board at our primary entryway that gives information about events occurring in the church in the next 4 weeks.
- Create better methods for capturing the contact information of those who visit worship and cultural events.
- Have more coffee hour fellowships after worship and the O.N.E. Committee was highly praised for starting coffee hours again.
- Have a different hands-on mission opportunity organized once a month for a year until the church has a sense of the one or two they feel most drawn to serve.
- Create the administrative and other infrastructure we need to have a second worship service that is more lively, modern, and different from our current worship service.
- Offer a joint Japanese language/English language book or Bible study, and market it to Japanese American college students in Denver, Boulder, and to area high schools.
- Make sure attractive printed invitations/fliers about the church's worship and other spiritual activities are available at every event that occurs at the church.
- Have pot lucks and other community meals again at least once a month to build a sense of shared community.
- Create more effective, inviting ways to follow through with people who attend church a few times but are unclear about how they can become more involved.

Additional topics came up that require more complete information. One is the desire to have a formal process of creating a new vision for the church and a strategic plan for implementing that vision. Rev. Vivian and church leaders are working on just such a process.

Another interest expressed more than once in the Dialogue sessions was a desire to reach out to people who have stopped attending church over the years and invite them to return. While it is always good for people within the church to invite their friends and family to return to church, research has shown that a formal effort on the part of church leaders is not effective in accomplishing this task.

One person expressed a desire for the church do a healing process. She was asked to create a proposal that could be presented at a Church Council meeting so we could better understand her idea. She was asked to contact Rev. Vivian when she is ready so her proposal can be placed on the Council's agenda.

Finally, it became clear that many people are not aware of how the church communicates with its own people. Some people thought that they should receive a personal call about meetings and the new processes in which the church is engaged.

Most committee and ministry team meetings are open to everyone. People may attend, and the committees welcome input, with the understanding that there are time limits as they have scheduled business to complete.

The church communicates about its business in four primary ways: announcements from the pulpit, printed announcements distributed as part of worship, all-church emails, and the newsletter. Social media is reserved for events and positive news, publicity, and marketing.



TO RECAP: Over the past year, the people of the church have provided their input through three separate efforts: the town halls held in the spring of 2017 when they learned that Rev. Thong would be moving on; through the retreat held in September of 2017; and through the Dialogue sessions offered this year.

NEXT STEP: Rev. Vivian will work with church leaders to gather a team of people from the church to review all the information gathered from the congregation during the past year. This team will work with Drew DiGiovanni, who provided such excellent leadership at the recent training seminar, to articulate the vision for the church based on what they heard from the people, and create a strategic plan for successfully implementing that vision in the next few years. This is the "Discuss" phase of the process.

They will give their reports on their work to the Council, which will give them feedback and vote on any proposals presented to them. This is the "Decide" phase of the process.

The congregation will be kept informed on the work of the Leadership Team through the reports given to the Church Council (which will be posted as part of the minutes of that meeting), and through articles in this newsletter.



SINGLE BOARD GOVERNANCE - Update

The Church Council received information about the possibility of moving from its current form of church management to a simpler one. (Please see the article in the February newsletter for a more complete explanation of this issue.) Because of the length of the Special Charge Conference that took place immediately preceding the Council meeting, it was quite late in the evening when the information was presented. There was a consensus that all would take the information home to study and address this idea more fully at the February Council meeting (7:00 pm on Wednesday, February 28).

O.N.E. Alive and Well

The ONE committee has committed to helping charities in our neighborhood. We will use our funds collected from bento sales and Arts & Crafts food sales from the past couple of years. We have decided to help the Action Center and the Colorado Homeless Families both located in Arvada. To be exact, we will help the Grubb Club which is under the Action Center, a center that helps homeless teens who have been emancipated from their homes. We will not only help financially, but plan to physically help at the two organizations. Anyone interested in helping out at any of the charities would be most welcome – you don't have to be a ONE committee member. In October of 2017, we donated to the Arvada Food Bank and United Methodist Committee on Relief for the Puerto Rico disaster from the kickback on reloadable grocery cards. So a big THANK YOU to all for supporting us by reloading your grocery gift cards and purchasing our CA sushi bowls.

On Saturday, February 24th, our committee will man an outdoor tent at the Arvada Winterfest where we will participate in a cultural event. Tom Fujita (and company?) will sing, Jane Nakama will demonstrate simple origami and also lead a hands-on class in origami, Kazuko Dishong will write names of interested people in Japanese calligraphy. We plan to advertise for the Hina Matsuri and the Food Bazaar which are coming up in March and in May. To entice people to our tent, we plan on giving out ribbon fish, butterflies and a small sample of rice crackers.

There is always an opportunity to reach out to those in need or are homebound. We plan to make and deliver meals to our homebound members and friends. If you know of someone who would like to be included in receiving meals, please let us know either through the church office or through a ONE committee member.

Ideas on leadership

I've been thinking a lot about leadership lately. What means to lead in a church, to lead volunteers, and to lead people of faith. When I came to Simpson about 5 years ago I was not looking to be a leader. I wanted to sing in the choir and later knit for the homeless and share fellowship time with some really good congregation members. When I was asked to be on the SPRC I thought this was another way I could serve this church.



Guidelines from the United Methodist Church on the SPRC state the following:

As a spiritual leader, a primary function you carry is to help those you lead to see as clearly as possible what God is calling your church to be and to do. Ideally, your church council first forms this vision and then forms plans and goals for how to fulfill that vision. As a leader, you will help your team remain focused and accountable to honor the vision and goals to which the church is committed.

The Staff/Pastor-Parish Relations Committee is the administrative unit in a local church where staff and congregational interests come together to focus on the mission of the church. Every congregation must have a SPRC to build relationships among members of the congregation and the staff that are most effective for accomplishing the mission and purpose of the church. Historically, the church is most effective when leaders who are growing in faith come together for a common purpose. During times of church growth and revival, spiritual leaders—both lay and clergy—have served together as servants of God.

There are times when doing a Google search you find just what you are looking for. Those of you who know me and the journey we have all been on this year can understand why this passage really speaks to me.

Galatians 6:9 Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up.

I challenge all of you to bring your Christian faith to Simpson UMC. Find your passion and use your love of God to do Christian works to grow this church. And most importantly to serve God.
