She wasn't distracted by the cartoons on the television, the toys on the floor or the roar of laughter as the adults engaged in conversation.

Lent is the Christian season of spiritual preparation before Easter. The purpose of the Lenten season is to set aside time for reflection on Jesus Christ—to consider his suffering, his sacrifice, his life, death, burial, and resur-

rection. Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. The forty days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin his ministry. Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter" and the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.



Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is also a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent began as a period for baptism of new Christians pledging to follow Jesus' teachings. Today, Christians focus on our relationship with God, growing as disciples and extending ourselves, often choosing to give up something or to add something to our daily routines by volunteering and giving of ourselves for others.

I hope during this Lenten season, you have an opportunity to depart from the worries and distractions of your life. I hope you find a moment of peace and a moment to look into a mirror to ponder your own life journey. I hope you consider the abundance that God has provided and discern how God has called you to live your life.

Attention All College Students

The Simpson United Methodist Church Scholarship Committee would like to encourage you to apply for the scholarship available through the church for continuing college students. This year we will make available The Gene and Kimiko Side Scholarship.

These scholarships will be awarded to continuing college students, and/or college graduates who are planning to further their education by entering into one of the following: a business, trade, technical, or vocational school; an undergraduate college or university program; or a graduate program. Scholarship recipients must demonstrate that they have been accepted into their selected program at an accredited educational institution. If you receive an award and are unable to pursue your education immediately after graduation, you are expected to return the scholarship funds and Simpson United Methodist Church will hold your scholarship funds in your name for up to five years.

Active participation in and support of Simpson United Methodist Church and Christian values is mandatory for scholarship consideration along with other factors such as involvement in the Japanese American community, grade point average, community service, and school activities. Eligibility for The Gene and Kimiko Side Scholarship requires an affiliation and involvement with Simpson United Methodist Church.

All participants are required to do community service at Simpson. For continuing college students a minimum of 5 hours must be completed prior to scholarship application due date.

The scholarship application form as well as the volunteer attestation form may be downloaded from the church website located at www.simpsonumc.com. The deadline for application is **April 2**, **2020** and will not be extended. **All applications must be postmarked by this date for consideration. Also, please email your application to sumcscholarship@gmail.com.**

Scholarship recipients are also expected to be present in worship on **Sunday, June 14**, at 10:00 a.m., for recognition and will be asked to speak briefly about their educational plans and how the received scholarship will help them achieve their educational goals. Simpson United Methodist Church: 113 Years of History, Fellowship and Community

Simpson United Methodist Church (Simpson) has a long history of fellowship and worship within the Japanese American community in Colorado. The church began in a small boarding house for Japanese immigrants in 1907 and has expanded to be a multicultural congregation deeply rooted in the Japanese American culture and experience. As a church, Simpson believes in a loving God who is near to everyone, and that God's love comes through one's personal encounters each day.

Simpson has always served as a safe haven for those who face racial prejudice. Church leaders recognized the importance of the Japanese American community to gather in support of each other, develop leadership skills and create networks. During and after WWII, church leaders. supported and heralded Governor Ralph Carr's efforts to allow Japanese and Japanese Americans to find refuge in Colorado.

Ministries at the church have enabled its members to forge lifelong friendships and relationships over the decades. In the late 1940's, a basketball team was formed that played in the Colorado Nisei Basketball League. A Little League baseball team was then formed, followed by the Simpson Bowling Team which continues to this day. Celebrating Japanese

culture is also a critical and meaningful component of Simpson. Many cultural events presented by the congregants are still thriving.

Hina Matsuri is a doll festival and celebration of Japanese culture, including a tea ceremony, ikebana display (floral arrangements), martial arts demonstrations and musical entertainment. It occurs the first weekend in March - this year on March 7 and 8 from 11:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. each day. The Annual Asian Food Bazaar will take place on May 2, 2020 and the Arts and Crafts Showcase be in October. All of these events proudly share Japanese and Japanese American traditions with the community, Pastor Leah

> As Simpson celebrates its 113-year history, the congregation has reflected on the many changes that have occurred in the life of the church. In 2019, the church faced the reality that has befallen many churches in the nation: namely, a multitude of competing priorities in people's lives. Simpson was faced with a choice: be the stewards of a declining church or take action and embark on a committed, proactive plan to sustain and grow the church. Simpson

congregants and Pastor Leah chose to be proactive.

After much self-examination, the church volunteers developed and implemented a comprehensive strategic plan for the revital-

ization of Simpson. A planning team of 12 church members was brought together along with two volunteer consultants to de-

velop the strategic plan, which is rooted in Simpson's vision statement: "to be a vibrant spiritual community that honors our Japanese American cultural heritage, welcomes involvement from a dynamic membership and builds a sustainable legacy for future generations."

Priorities of the plan include expanding the church's presence and outreach to the neighborhood and the broader Japanese American com-

munity, and enhancing the Japanese culture within the church


