#### SAKURA SQUARE LLC - VACANT POSITIONS

Sakura Square LLC currently has two job opportunities. Here are brief descriptions:

#### Administrative Coordinator - part-time position

Seeking a team member with the skills to contribute to Sakura Square's role as the cultural center of the Japanese American community. Sakura Square LLC's sole owner is Sakura Foundation and the Administrative Coordinator will primarily assist with fulfilling the Foundation's mission to celebrate and support the Japanese/ Japanese American heritage, culture and community through programming, events, grants, scholarships and its signature leadership program. This is a part-time position of approximately 15-20 hours per week.

#### **Operations Coordinator - full-time position**

Seeking a team member with the business, administrative and interpersonal skills to contribute to Sakura Square's role as the cultural center of the Japanese American community. The Operations Coordinator will be responsible for implementing tasks for business operations functions. This is a nonexempt, full-time position.





Fill out your census form at <u>www.2020census.gov</u>. It takes less than a minute per person living in your house.

For each person listed in this year's census, up to \$2,300, is allocated for federal funding each year. Funding for infrastructure, healthcare, education, school lunch programs, low income housing, utility assistance (LEAP), mental health care, children health insurance plans (CHIP), and childcare and development.

## 2020 Census

Last year Colorado received \$13B in federal funds based on the census count in 2010. That's right, this

year's census numbers will be used over the next ten years to allocate federal funds to Colorado. This means a family of four that is not counted will cost Colorado \$92,000 in federal funds over the next ten years.

If you live in a multiracial home, the person listed as Person 1 on the census form should take care to accurately describe the racial composition of the other persons living in the household. This impacts demographic studies for political, economic, and social policies decisions.

Each person living in your house should be listed in the census form, regardless of blood relations, citizenship, immigration or refugee status, including babies. This information is protected by Law, Title 13, and cannot be shared, not even through Executive Orders. Failure to comply with Title 13 is punishable by fines up to \$250,000 and/or 5 years imprisonment. Individual home census information WILL NOT be used or shared with local municipalities or landlords if more than the allowable code or rental agreement allows are listed on the census forms.

The 2020 census is especially important for Asian Americans. The AAPI population is the fastest growing demographic in the US but are the census group least likely to participate in the Census (Hard-to-count). Hard-to -count groups are "racial and ethnic minorities, persons who do not speak English fluently, lower income persons, undocumented immigrants, and persons who distrust the government." About 32 percent of Asians living in the United States are noncitizens and account for 14 percent of the undocumented population. Roughly 35 percent have high rates of limited English proficiency, and about one in five Asian households rely on children under 13 to interpret for the household and at least two-thirds of the over 22 million AAPI immigrants in the US arrived within the last ten years. Inaccurate counts Asian communities make it difficult to measure and address their needs and directly affect their access to government services (e.g., health services, human services, education and training, and housing). Organizations that aim to serve communities with undercounted data often go underfunded, and areas where these groups live receive less investment to be counted.
